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Remembering Debbie Friedman, z"l

No matter how you think the world works, it is an amazing coincidence that Debbie Friedman, *zichrona livracha*, died the week of Shabbat *Shira*, the Shabbat of song. Going forward, this women's indelible contribution to the Jewish people will be commemorated at the same time that we read the Song at the Sea, celebrating the escape of the Israelites from Egypt and eliminating once and for all being pursued by the enemy Egyptians.

In 1975 I was first introduced to Debbie's music in earnest. During my high school years I learned many more of her songs. Her music was my music, her exuberance my exuberance. This was clear at her funeral that was webcast from Santa Ana, California, where she was accompanied into the next world with her own music. From "Sing Unto God" sung *acapella* by Craig Taubman to "Devorah's Song" sung by Josh Nelson to "Miriam's Song" led by Julie Silver it was a funeral both poignant and warm, energetic and elegiac. This is a woman who, like her namesake Devorah in the Book of Judges, transformed how thousands and thousands of Jews experienced Judaism. Originally an outsider, maligned by the cantorial establishment, her music seeped into synagogues from people who attended camp: it was too energetic to ignore. It was and is too good to ignore. No longer passive, Debbie's music was the opening to involve congregants in song.

Debbie was not professionally trained; her sound was influenced by the folk music she was hearing in the 1960s and 1970s. Over the course of her career you could almost hear how her thinking evolved, how the lyrics changed. As egalitarianism expanded

throughout liberal Judaism, Debbie's music and lyrics reflected this. She was a wonderful teacher, a mentor, a friend, and a fierce advocate for what she affirmed.

We are diminished that she is no longer in this world in her body. Yet her voice continues to be heard, in her music, in our voices. Her memory is a blessing that we will honor every time we lift up our voices in her songs.

– with her newly published children’s book, “Nicely Dunn and the Lost Little Sister,” now available in the bookstore. For Nancy, the bookstore is filled with fond memories of the former inn and her early days in Vermont. “And now my book is there!” It is also sold on Amazon.com and the Barnes and Noble website.

In addition to her children’s book, Nancy is also the author of three yet to be published novels.

Nancy and her family have been members of ICM since services were held behind the lumber yard near the railroad tracks in Manchester. They attended High Holy Day services there, led by Julius Isaacs, who was instrumental in building the synagogue at its current location. “We have a long history with the temple.”

At a very young age Nancy became “very disaffected” with her temple at home. She loves ICM because “it’s so welcoming and the people are so warm.” Her daughter Phoebe, now 3½, whom Nancy adopted from Vietnam, was named at ICM by Rabbi Novak. “She loves him.” When she first brought Phoebe up, the members were “so warm – you just don’t find that.”

Nancy tries to come to Vermont twice a month, long weekends and holiday weeks. She loves to come to Shabbat services and the pot-luck dinners and attend High Holy Day services here with her parents.

Before devoting herself to writing full time, the author worked as a copywriter at an advertising agency in Manhattan. She was later transferred to Bombay, where she was based for three years and later spent two years working in Sydney, Australia.

Nancy spent a month in Vietnam going through the adoption process, accompanied by her parents. “The people there are such beautiful people and [Vietnam] is such beautiful place,” she enthused. “It was an amazing experience.”

Born in NYC and raised on Long Island, Nancy now lives on the Upper East Side in a cramped one-bedroom apartment with her boyfriend and Phoebe. She writes at home and freelances at an ad agency in midtown. For her, coming to Vermont is like a “retreat – with open air and beautiful people – it’s the ultimate balance to live in New York City and have Vermont.” She feels very lucky to have had the experience of coming to Vermont since she was a baby. Her parents, who still have the house in Winhall, live just eight blocks from Nancy in Manhattan. “It’s been fantastic. We’re very lucky to have them

around and very lucky to have had the opportunity to experience Vermont because of them.” Nancy has toyed with the idea of living in Vermont. “I have a fantasy of living there. It’s such a creative place, with a lot of creative people – writers, sculptors . . . I think I could be part of such a creative community.”

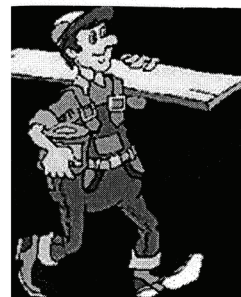

Tu B’Shvat Seder Wrap-up

On Sunday, January 23, we held our annual *Tu B’Shvat Seder* at ICM, attended by about 20 people including some from Temple Beth El of Bennington. The *Tu B’Shvat Seder* is modeled on the Passover *Seder* and is a celebration of a new year for trees, vines and their fruits as well as the abundant gifts of the natural world. It also celebrates the renewal of our vision, our connection to our inner selves and to the natural world and its Source.

The *Seder* was prepared and conducted by **Dina Bronson**. It included the eating of fruits representing the four seasons and the drinking of four glasses of wine (juice) after reciting the appropriate prayers.

After the *Seder* a meal was served consisting mostly of food prepared from the fruits of trees and vines. The highlight was a bread baked by Dina depicting two trees with intertwined branches and root, a true representation of the spirit of the holiday.
